

The Many Laces of Italy Betty Manfre

Betty Manfre is an Italian-American who has lived in Milan, Italy, for over 20 years. In 1989, she found herself living in Brussels, Belgium, with her family. Unable to work as a registered nurse, she turned her interests to lace making, learned Torchon and Duchesse, and began teaching Torchon at the American Women's Club. This quickly became a passion. On returning to Milan, near the town of Cantú, she learned to make and design Cantú lace. She continues to attend Il Giardino dei Ounti, a lace school in Milan, where she has become proficient in Cantú. She has won awards at the Gorizia and Sansepolcro International Lace Exhibitions. She has also represented her Milan lace school as a Cantú teacher in Naples, Italy. Her work has been published several times in the international magazines *Rakam* and *Ricamo Italiano*.

Many small communities throughout Italy, "Il Bel Paese," enjoy a history of lace making. Betty will touch on examples of lace from these towns, while focusing mainly on the larger lace schools and organizations.

The Classes

Milanese Lace—All Levels

Teacher: Louise Colgan

Milanese is a free-flowing form of tape lace characterized by special decorative stitches that become integral features of each design. The creative nature of this type of lace makes it suitable for both traditional and contemporary interpretation. This course will cover all levels of Milanese techniques. A wide variety of patterns will be provided to suit both new and continuing Milanese students. Lacemakers will be given the option of using colored threads to make their own unique pieces from the selected patterns. As with other similar free-style laces, individual interpretation of each pattern is part of the learning process. A solid foundation in basic Bobbin Lace skills is required. Ability to read diagrams is also recommended.



Louise Colgan is a lacemaker, designer, and teacher with experience in a broad range of Bobbin Lace
techniques. She began making lace in 1985 and has been teaching for 25 years. She is a Past President of the International Old
Lacers, Inc. and is now the Proficiency Program Committee Chair. As an instructor, she offers classes locally on an ongoing basis and
travels extensively around the U.S., teaching at many regional conferences and annual I.O.L.I. Conventions. In the fall of 2012, she
was invited to teach workshops at the Australian Lace Guild's National Conference in Sydney and Tasmania. In her capacity as a
lacemaker and designer, Louise has exhibited her work both locally and internationally. Her designs have been presented in the
LACE EXPRESS magazine and the I.O.L.I. BULLETIN. Additionally, she has published three books of original patterns and has made an
instructional video on Milanese Lace through Hensel Productions.



Contemporary Lace—New Applications of Traditional Techniques—Intermediate and Advanced Teacher: Holly Van Sciver

Using a Martine Bruggeman design, or one of your own selection or creation, Holly will show you how to apply traditional free, tape, and continuous lace techniques to translate the design into lace.

Beginners will make a Martine Bruggeman design, where all the colors and stitches are worked out and diagrammed in advance, so its easy! In this class, there is no possibility of mistakes—just fun painting with threads in any style or direction you want!

Continuing students of Holly's adapted or original designs in floral Beds (Lester) or Floral Bucks are welcome. *Prerequisites: Strong fundamentals of bobbin lace*

Holly has been a student and teacher of lacemaking for over 39 years. Originally trained in England, she teaches a wide variety of laces but specializes in 19th Century English laces. Her most recent work features Lester and floral Bucks designs, as well as interpretive lacemaking of non-traditional designs. She has taught and lectured internationally and is a leader in teaching the fundamentals underlying lacemaking theory and design.


Cantú—All Levels Teacher: Betty Manfre

Coasters, bookmarks, flowers, or figures can be made while learning Cantú bobbin lace.

The techniques included are Classic Cantú (Venetian Piont), Mimosa, Punto Ornato (used in making animals and figures), and Italian Rosaline. The class project will be chosen according to the level of ability and interest of the individual student.

Betty will also be our keynote speaker at the banquet





Withof and a Potpourri of Lace—All Levels Teacher: Susie Johnson

This class has been designed for the student who is looking for something just a bit different.

Projects for a variety of laces will be on the menu, including the beautiful art nouveau designs of Withof, historic and airy Brussels Duchesse, 's Gravenmoerse with its unusual half stitch, traditional Torchon, and the always lovely geometric Bucks. Looking for help with tension or understanding the logic of your lace? Happy with

your lace but feeling the need to tweak it? This is the place for you. And don't forget the UFO opportunities in this class! Upon request and approval, students are welcome to pursue other laces, including help with stalled or long-awaited projects.

Since she started making lace in 1981, Susie pursued the serious study many different types of laces with different teachers from a number of different countries. Although best known for her work in Withof, she has also been teaching many other laces for over 20 years at events such as IOLI conventions, The Winter Lace Conference, the Finger Lakes Lace Days in Ithaca, and Lace at Sweet

Briar, as well as twice-weekly classes at home. Her work has been exhibited internationally, and she has been the co-coordinator of the International Poppy Project.




Beginning Bead Knitting—or "Adding Bling With Sticks and Strings"—All Levels Teacher: Kathy Kirchner

Students will learn seven ways of adding beads while knitting a sampler suitable for uses as a bookmark or "page weight". The first session will cover understanding bead diagrams and the hands-on application, the second, students will draft their own bead designs—in one color or multiple - and begin to knit a beaded bag. A fun and relaxing project is planned for the third session.

Full instructions, arranged in approximate order of difficulty, are given to allow the leaves to be worked in nine different ways. In terms of difficulty, they range from the most basic of lacemaking techniques to a more demanding selection of Milanese braids: Ribbon, Ovals (plus a variation), Lattice 1, and Kisses.

Knitting techniques covered include increasing, decreasing, knitting in the round, and i-cord. Basic knitting skills required.

Spanish Dolina Lace—All Levels

Teacher: Dagmar Beckel-Machyckova

Spania Dolina is a village in Slovakia, where lace was used as main source of income for families of miners. Traditionally colorful lace used to decorate folk clothing in Central and Eastern Europe, it is a form of continuous lace. To be authentic it has to be made of a minimum of 25 pairs, roughly a 3.25" width. We will start with a simple pattern of 11 pairs and work our way up to a full doily edging of 25 pairs. We'll accompany the quiet moments of lacemaking by reading stories of European lacemakers from the 1800s. Basic lacemaking skills are required—full stitch and half stitch.

Original pillows and bobbins will be available for purchase but not required for the class.

Dagmar says she was 9 years old and on a vacation in Slovakia when she encountered lacemaking. Since then, she has been a student as well as a teacher of the art. She has earned a Lacemaker Degree from the School Institute of Art Manufacturing (Prague, Czech Republic, 2001), studied Honiton lace in the UK, and is author of several articles on bobbin lace. Dagmar says she finds lace completely thrilling, and it always makes her feel like she has a special ability to connect to history.

WITHOF and a POTPOURRI of LACE—With Susie Johnson (full day)

Susie Johnson's Friday's class will provide the student with more opportunity for in-depth discussions than is possible in a regular class day. This class is not for people new students but is suited to all continuing people who would like to have a day where they would have more teacher time and as many questions and answers that can be crammed into one day along with technical discussions and lots of theory in addition to tweaking their work. This class is also ideal for those wanting to finish (or start) a project.
